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Not everyone needs a German dictionary with 500,000 voices, but the typical Paperback dictionary has only 40,000 voices or not. You will feel very frustrated using a dictionary that is not up to your needs. Note that a double-language dictionary with 500,000 voices is actually only 250,000 for each language. Don't get a dictionary with less than 40,000 voices. Monoling and German dictionaries offer different disadvantages, especially when you are just at the beginning of your German learning. For intermediate and advanced students they could serve from additional dictionaries to expand their ability to circumscribe some things. While they usually contain more voices are also very heavy and not very practical for daily use. These are dictionaries for serious linguistic students, not for German medium students. If you are a beginner, I highly recommend you get a German-English dictionary to be very clear about what a word could mean. Take a look at a few sometimes I met German students who bought their dictionaries in Germany because they were simply very expensive in their country of origin. The problem was often that those were English-German dictionaries, which means that they were made for the Germans who were learning English. That had some huge disadvantages. Because the user was German do not need to write German items or plural forms in the dictionary that made these books simply useless for German students. So be aware of such problems and choose a written dictionary for German students as a foreign language (= deutsch als fremdsprache). Even a few years ago there was no substitute for a real print dictionary you could hold in my hands, but nowadays German dictionaries are the way to go. They are extremely useful and can save you a lot of time. They also have a huge advantage over any card dictionary: they weigh absolutely nothing. In the age Smartphone, you will always have some of the best dictionaries at your fingertips wherever you are. The advantages of those dictionaries are simply fantastic. However, About.com offers its English glossaries and English links to many German dictionaries that can still be quite useful. Sometimes a normal German, no matter how good it can be, simply is not enough for work. This is when a medical, technical, commercial, scientific or other industrial dictionary is required. These specialized dictionaries tend to be expensive, but fill up. Some are available online. Any delicate dictionary is decided, make sure it has the basis: the article, which means the sex of names, nouns of nouns, of the genitive finals of names, cases for German prepositions and at least 40,000 entries. Economic printing dictionaries often lack this information and is not worth buying. Most online dictionaries also provides audio samples of how a word is pronounced. It is advisable to look for a natural pronunciation as eg, Languee. Under the Black Land Let, which entered into force on 19 June 1913, South African blacks were no more able to possess, or even rent, land outside the designated reserves. These reserves not only amounted to only 7 Á ç à, ~ "8% of the land of South Africa but they were even less fertile than the lands set by the white owners. The Native Land Act Sansosseded Black South Africans and prevent them from competing with White farmers for jobs. Because Sol Plaatje wrote in the native life opening lines in South Africa, Á ç à, ~ "Friday morning, on June 20, 1913, the Native South African found himself, not actually one Slave, but a pariah in the land of his birth.
